In 1987, we were moving our Scandinavian Studies department from Aberdeen down to Edinburgh, and for the first time it became possible to appoint a full-time lecturer in Danish, followed by Norwegian in 1989. Working together, we were able to build from the ground up a reputable Scandinavian centre of note in Edinburgh. We were not wrong.

Given Bjarne's modesty and kindness, as well as his attentiveness and skill as a supervisor, we have found him to be a first-rate friend, colleague, and mentor. We are not surprised to see that this sentiment is one shared by many others featured as contributors to this splendid volume.

We greatly appreciate all Bjarne has done since our paths first crossed thirty-five years ago, and wish him a long and happy retirement.
